An up-to-date HPV vaccination measure was added to assess completion of the HPV vaccine series (2-doses separated by 5 months (minus 4 days) for immunocompetent adolescents initiating the HPV vaccine series before their 15<sup>th</sup> birthday and 3 doses for all others).
